Sustainability Report for 5-2-'22 Board Meeting Report prepared by Joanne D'Antonio, GVGC Sustainability Representative

Community Forest Advisory Committee (CFAC) 4-7-'22 (meets first Thursday of the month)
City staff reported that tree disclosure form to be used before approval of development or construction only covers protected trees, street trees and certain eucalyptus trees, whereas earlier versions required disclosure of all trees. Planning Dept. said they did not want to be overly burdensome on the applicant.
CFAC Chair said this was not want the were hoping for.

Plancheck NC 4-9-'22 (meets 2nd Saturday of the month)

A lot of state bills and city council files were presented that affect the quality sustainability and quality of life, but it was too late to get them on our agenda for the Government Relations Committee April 12 meeting. We should see it there is a way to have our GR meeting to work with this.

Caltrans Beautification 4-12-'22

Caltrans is planting all native plants in the area around the 170 Fwy in our area, but they are not planting shade trees, giving concerns about trimming crews proximity to traffic as the reason.

Community Forest Advisory Committee (CFAC) Policy Subcommittee 4-21-'22

Tree of the month – California bay, a great native species to plant, and the leaves can be used in cooking. Arbor Day 40 native trees were given away by City Plants and TreePeople only gave away native trees. Objection was raised that Protected Tree Ordinance tree removals have been allowing replanting of 3 trees in one hole, which is not mitigation. If there is no room for sustainable replanting, the protected tree should be allowed to remain in place.

CFAC helped get Council File 15-0499-S2 introduced requiring a report back to give recommendations relative to ongoing tree and biodiversity planning, strategies and/or efforts to protect and grow the City's urban canopy, as instructed by the Council on August 12, 2020 (CF 15-0499-SI); and provide recommendations to require the placement of trees, and timing of any tree removals, at an earlier phase in the land use/environmental review, and permitting review process, and thereby maximize City efforts to grow tree canopy coverage; and (3) prepare and present an ordinance to effectuate these directives.

Community Forest Advisory Committee (CFAC) Enforcement Subcommittee 4-26-'22

Urban Forestry staff reported that the there are no tree experts in Planning to advise about trees and no department or funding at Urban Forestry to deal with property trees except the 6 species of protected trees. Also, they have no good mechanism for enforcing tree violations beyond a \$200 fine and a requirement to replant. A better system is needed given the value of a tree that gets removed illegally. CFAC pointed out that Santa Monica has a way to calculate the value of a tree and enforces fines. Also, according to the LA Times in 1991 there was a \$1000 fine, jail sentence for up to 6 months, and a 10-year ban on development if a protected oak has been removed. Can Google Maps photos begin to be used as evidence? These issues need to be taken up with the City Attorney.
